## TWO TOWNS-ONE BOOK 2023 KICK-OFF JO ANNE ROBBINS

Our Kick-Off Event is scheduled for Sunday, January 22, 2023, at 2:00pm in the Program Rooms A-C at the Library. Our presenter is Jerry Peppers, the New York Director and Life Member of the Lincoln Highway Association (LHA). The LHA was formed in 1992 to reprise the organization of the same name that in 1913 proposed, identified an alignment of, declared, and then administered the original Lincoln Highway (LH) connecting New York Times Square to San Francisco Pacific Park. The LHA has a Director for each of its 14 states and its goal is to identify and map all of the alignments of the original highway, protect and preserve the road and points of interest along the way, and educate the public as to its history, route, and points of interest.

Mr. Peppers has attended every Annual Conference of the LHA since 2008 across all of the 14 states the LH passes through, and has crisscrossed the US on various alignments of the LH five times. He was instrumental in getting a permanent street sign posted in Times Square at the Eastern Terminus of the LH, has authored several articles about various LH topics and has appeared in three

made for TV documentaries about the LH. A favorite activity until his retirement was to walk the three blocks from his 45<sup>th</sup> Street Times Square office which overlooked the Eastern Terminus, to meet tourists from all over the world who were about to traverse the LH, post his iconic paper sign on a post at Broadway and 42<sup>nd</sup> Street, and photograph the travelers with their cars and the sign as they embarked on their westward journey.

Jerry's life has always been about the journey rather than the destination. While he has traveled much of the world for business transactions, in the three plus years

since retirement, he has spent much time exploring America by car, Boston to Long Beach, New York to Key West, logging approximately 120,000 miles through 48 states to date. In addition to the LHA, he is a member of road organizations following the old U.S. Route 66, the Dixie Highway, the Jefferson Highway, U.S. Route 6 and the Yellowstone Highway. But no matter where, it is not ultimately about roads, buildings, history or scenery, it is always about the people! Jerry has many stories to tell and a wealth of information to share. Don't miss this first event as we explore a great book and a great American road. Registration is not required.

Two Towns-One Book enters the new year with another winning book, The Lincoln *Highway* by Amor Towles. Instead of heading west toward California, they head east. Two boys take the Lincoln Highway from Nebraska to New York City making stops as they go. Amor Towles may be a familiar name as he is a New York Times best-selling author of A Gentleman in Moscow and Rules of Civility. The Lincoln Highway is the third book he has written. 

Amor Towles was born and raised in the Boston area. He graduated from Yale College and received an MA in English from Stanford University. Having worked as an investment professional for over twenty years, he now devotes himself full time to writing in Manhattan, where he lives with his wife and two children. His novels Rules of Civility, A Gentleman in Moscow, and The Lincoln *Highway* have collectively sold more than six million copies and been translated into more than thirty languages. Both Bill Gates and President Barack Obama included A Gentleman in Moscow and The Lincoln *Highway* on their annual book recommendation lists.

## FOL MOVES TO NEW MEMBERSHIP STRUCTURE TOM AND JUDY CORIGLIANO

Effective January 1, 2023, the Friends of the (Clifton Park-Halfmoon) Library (FOL), will move to a new "membership year."

For many years, the membership year for the FOL has been from January 1 to December 31. Under this system, all memberships expired at the end of the year, and all had to be renewed beginning January 1<sup>st</sup>.

As the FOL membership approaches 500, and with a new database being introduced, beginning January 1, 2023, all new and renewed memberships will be for 12 months from the date of your membership application. For example, if you renew your membership on January 27, 2023, then your next renewal date would be January 27, 2024.

Under this system, and again, thanks to our new database, members will receive an email notice prior to their renewal date, telling them that it's time to renew. As in the past, you may renew your membership by completing a form at the Library or by downloading a copy of the form on the Friends website. Just go to the <u>Friends of the Library website</u> to download the application form.

We thank you for your membership and support and look forward to seeing you at the first Used Book Sale of the year in January (Friday, January 27 – Sunday, January 29).

## NEW YORK LIBRARY ASSOCIATION 2022 ANNUAL CONFERENCE & TRADE SHOW MARY FRAN VEROSTEK

The NYLA Annual Conference, the largest state library association conference held on the East Coast, took place at the City Center in Saratoga Springs, New York on the first weekend of November. Attendees included librarians, trustees, and library supporters from a cross section of libraries (school, academic, public, and special) located throughout New York State. Attendance at the conference allowed participation in a wide variety of programs, including those sponsored by NYLA affiliates, such as the Friends of Libraries Section (FLS).

The FLS sponsored three programs that I was able to attend. The day started with "Trivia, Literati, and Wildly Successful Community Fundraising," presented by Kerry A. Barnes, Executive Director of the Tompkins County Public Library Foundation. Two fundraising events were described in detail. The first was a Read-A-Thon that used peer-to-peer fundraising. The fundraising led up to a final culminating Read-A-Thon event that celebrated the participants! The event was the motivation for the participants to read, possibly in costume or with props, in front of a bookshelf-patterned shower curtain! The second event was modeled on the National Public Radio program "Wait Wait…Don't Tell Me!" entitled, "Hold On…Let me Ask a Librarian!" - complete with a script, local celebrity panelists, and trivia such as, "Which of these have been found as a bookmark?"

Jim Foster, CPH Library Assistant Director, and Cheryl Shelton Jones, Youth Services Librarian of Ethelbert B. Crawford Public Library in Monticello, NY, presented "Keeping it Friendly: Connecting Staff and Friends." Jim is currently the Library Liaison to our Friends organization – "It's in my job description!" He shared that the Friends have existed for thirty years, and that the original intent was promotion of "Get Out The Vote." He then outlined our many committees and shared our numerous accomplishments (<u>see this in other Book Friendly issues</u>). Lisa C. Wemett, First Vice President of the Friends of Libraries Section and the FLS Coordinator for Professional Development, concluded the session with a discussion regarding a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) - "a written agreement that specifies the principles and guidelines under which the various parties seek to clarify and formalize their respective roles, responsibilities, and general arrangements for working together." The library and the Friends assess their mutual goals, taking into account the missions of both of these distinct groups.

We left the Saratoga Springs City Center for lunch and later strolled to the Saratoga Springs Public Library for a "Field Trip to a Friends-Operated Bookstore." Jeff Budge, Bookstore Manager of the Friends Book Shop for the past eleven years, presented a detailed look into the challenges of managing staff and inventory of their yearround book shop. From their humble beginnings with a cart and a cigar money box to their current location on the first floor of the library, with over 150 categories of books, and their online presence, it's an ongoing fundraising success story. There are three goals: to sell merchandise in-store to cover a library wish list, to benefit the community with special sales to the public, and lastly, outreach to not-for-profit organizations. He attributed their success to magic ingredients which include: interested people, space within the library, a supportive Friends board, and coordination with the library director. The presentation concluded with a behind-the-scenes tour and celebratory cake in recognition of 30 years of EFR & FLS!







## PAVERS HAVE BEEN INSTALLED AFTER LONG COVID DELAY JANICE JASKOLKA

I am happy to report that the delay in paver installation is over! In September, nineteen pavers were added around the library. And, we currently have two more orders.

So now is the time to think about . . .

Who am I thankful for?

What special event or achievement can I commemorate – a wedding, anniversary, graduation, retirement, or the birth of a grandchild?

Who in my life that I dearly loved has passed away?

Where are pavers available for engraving?

FLAGPOLE: The Flagpole area is reserved as a memorial to members of the United States Armed Forces. Pavers are placed in a circular pattern around the flagpole. These bricks may be engraved with "In honor of" or "In memory of."

READING GARDEN: This area in the rear of the library includes our reading garden, water feature and seating. The Reading Garden is the largest area where the engraved pavers can be located. These bricks may be engraved with a choice of a name and message or a favorite book or author.

ENTRANCE: This is the front atrium area where the obelisk is located. This has the most traffic of the three paved areas. These bricks may be engraved with a name and/or a short message.

## JOURNALING IN THE NEW YEAR! JANINE CAMMARATA

A new year is upon us, and I hope that it's a magical, positive, and healthy one for you. This time of year is naturally a new beginning where we have the opportunity to begin anew and do all that we wish we had done in the previous year.

That can be a powerful motivator but at any time of the year, whether January 1 or July 1, you can begin again. You can start the project you've meant to start a month ago or you can finally learn that new language, instrument, etc.

There's this urgency to keep moving forward onto the next thing, which I don't know about you, but tends to make me feel like I haven't accomplished enough.

In order to move forward intentionally, it's helpful to reflect on where you've been, what you've done, how you've been, and how you've felt during the past year. - What were the impacts of those goals or intentions?

b. Perhaps you decided to connect with a friend a month and have fostered deeper and richer relationships and met more people along the way.

- 5. Who lifted you during 2022?
  - a. Whose company did you enjoy?
  - b. Who do you want to spend time with more often?

6. What worked for you in relationship to your career, finances, personal life, volunteering, spiritual life, creativity, etc.?

a. What didn't work or what did you realize you no longer wanted to do and why?

b. What brought you joy?

Give yourself credit for all the amazing things/acts you've done in 2022. Remember the connections you made, the people you met, the beautiful places you visited. Think about the movies you saw, the books you read, the games you played. These are the snapshots of your life, and you are the catalyst behind the how far you have come.

## YEARNING FOR SPRING: FOL ANNUAL PLANT SWAP AND SALE


All of us who garden find that a healthy garden gets away on us very quickly! So, as you clear and prep your garden this spring, please think about splitting and donating those excess perennials!

## THE CLIFTON PARK-HALFMOON PUBLIC LIBRARY FOUNDATION Ed Rodger

The Clifton Park Halfmoon Library Foundation was created upon the occasion of the Library's 50th anniversary in the late Fall of 2019. Several library supporters volunteered to serve on the Board, and we began to think about what projects we might take on.

We developed a mission statement:

The goal of the Foundation is to enrich the overall services of the Library by funding programs and projects that traditionally are not or would not be financed through local tax dollars or other public resources reflected in the annual library budget. Monies raised by the Foundation will be used to support programs and projects that fall outside the scope of the annual budget of the Library, and might not be initiated or continued without supplemental private funding. In the long run the Foundation will support development of an endowment to provide continuing financial support.

In January 2020, we approached a graphic design class taught by Sallie Way at Shenendehowa High School to develop a logo for the foundation and selected a design by Alex Scholz from the many designs created by the class.

We decided to meet in April 2020 to start planning how to introduce the Foundation to our community. Unfortunately, the pandemic had different plans.

We were able to conduct two Giving Tuesday campaigns which raised funds to support the library purchases to augment "bridging the digital divide."

We currently have collected a little over \$12,000. Although we had a slow start, we are growing stronger.

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
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
